Public Transportation

High Speed Rail/Train: Transfer from Zuoying HSR station or Kaohsiung Main Station to the Kaohsiung Metro red line. Alight at Shihjia Metro Station (R7), then walk along Zhongshan 3rd Road from Exit 1 (approx. 4 min walk).

Metro: Walk approximately 170 m down Zhongshan 3rd Road from Exit 1 of Shihjia Metro Station (R7) on the red line (approx. 4 min walk).

Light Rail: Walk approximately 1.1 km from Cianjhen Star Station or Commerce and Trade Park Station (approx. 14 min walk).

City Bus: Take Bus 12A, 12C, 25, 69A, 69A (Xueming Community), 69B, or 69B (Xueming Community) to Guanghua Intersection (Zhongshan 3rd Rd.), then walk approximately 120 m down Zhongshan 3rd Road (approx. 2 min walk).

Inter-city Bus: Take a Kenting bus to Dream Mall, then walk approximately 270 m down Zhongshan 3rd Road (approx. 4 min walk).

Metered Parking

Roadside parking spaces (Zhengqin Road), Sun Moon Pavillion Zhengqin parking lot, Zhengqin Zhonghua public parking lot

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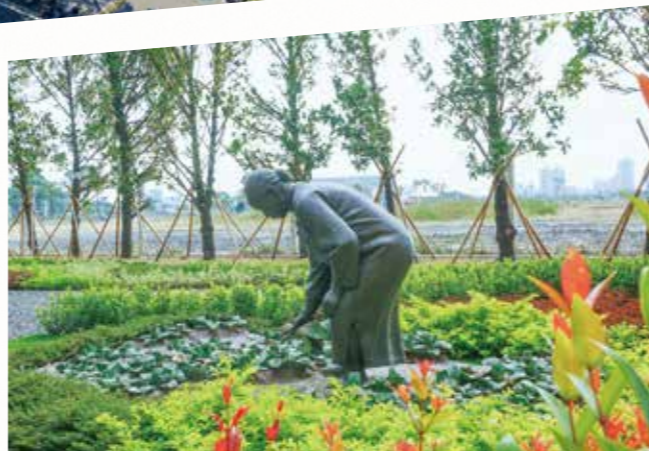
10 Old Tree Square

This used to be a resting area for staff where they would engage in exercise or enjoy outdoor movie screenings. Today, it is a forested garden for arts and recreational activities.



11 Truck Scale Remnants

Before, the truck scale sat in front of the plant gate and was operated by designated employees from the security department, who would efficiently control the weight of shipments coming in and out.



12 Grandma Memorial Garden

Mrs. Wang Jhan-Yang, the "FPG Grandma", was the mother of FPG's founders, Yung-Ching Wang and Yung-Tsai Wang. The family had a harsh life early on. Mrs. Wang was the breadwinner of the family, personally growing crops and tending livestock. She embodied diligence, perseverance, frugality, and trustworthiness. These values deeply influenced the Wang brothers, who applied this down-to-earth philosophy to the business management of FPG.



13 Clock Tower

Once the security station, the bells on the tower would ring 3 tolls 3 times, totaling 9 tolls, when the workday started and ended. They would ring 1 toll 3 times, 3 tolls in sum, for break time.



14 Plastics Industry Hall

Built in 1960, it was used as a warehouse for materials and now has become the Plastics Industry Hall. The 1st floor showcases FPC's and Nan Ya's early manufacturing equipment, like FPC's first 4-ton polymerization tank and Nan Ya's no. 0 calender. The 2nd floor serves as an exhibition space.



15 Wang Founders' Office

Once the Wang brothers' office, it expanded as the company scaled up and the chairperson's office was added in 1961. There, the two founders drafted the blueprint for FPG's future.



16 FPC Fountain

The sign shows the acronym of Formosa Plastics Corporation, marking the site of the fountain that once stood in front of the office.



17 Green Slope Theater

The winding path ascends and connects the preserved tanks and chimneys from different angles. The amphitheater-style seats provide a space for visitors to rest and gather, as well as an excellent performance venue.

18 2nd Generation Polymerization Tank

In 1957, the FPC Kaohsiung Plant faced low PVC production, high production costs, and export barriers. Regardless, the Wang brothers overcame challenges and added a 17-ton 2nd gen polymerization tank that resulted in the first production expansion in 1958, gradually opening up the export market.



19 1st Generation Polymerization Tank

FPC Kaohsiung Plant began production in 1957 and was the smallest PVC plant in the world at the time. This is its 1st gen polymerization tank, representing the starting line of plastics in Taiwan.



20 City Light Pillar

Built in 1957 and standing nearly 30m tall, it is the Kaohsiung Plant's highest structure. This chimney symbolizes the beginning of Taiwan's first PVC plant, as well as its flourishing future. Today, it is illuminated with LED lights on the sides and at the top, serving as Kaohsiung City's beacon, its Light Pillar.

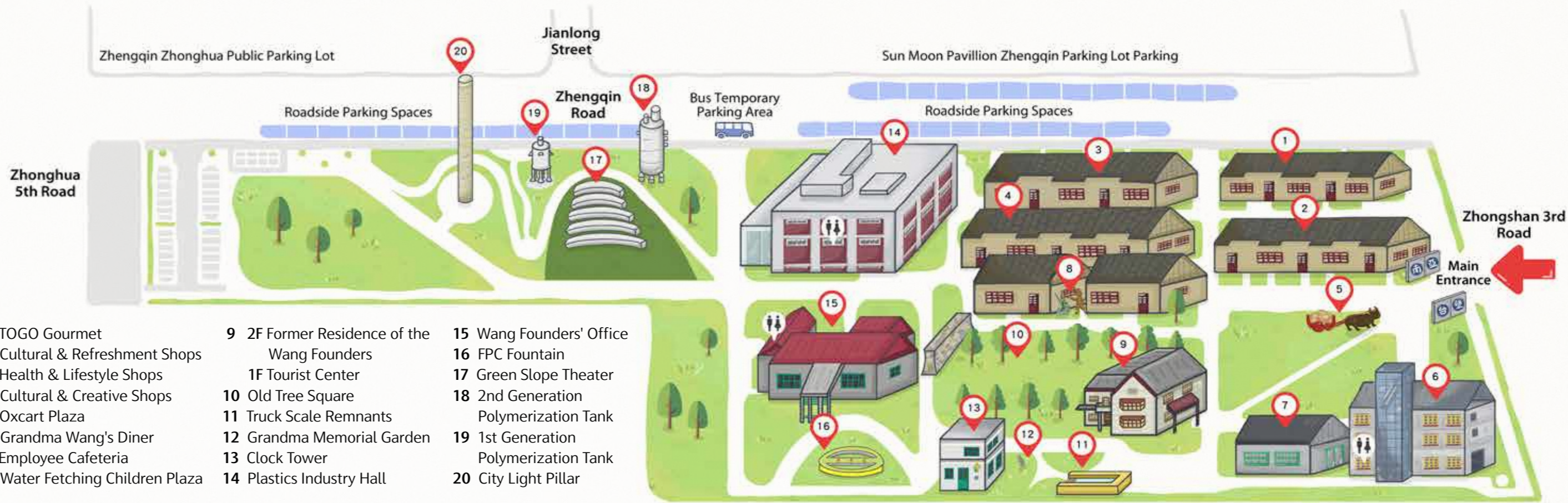
Park Story

From the world's smallest PVC plant to the largest petrochemical group worldwide...

The Founders Yung-ching Wang and Yung-tsai Wang received a U.S. aid loan of US\$780,000 in 1954 to establish Fumao Plastics Corp., later renamed Formosa Plastics Corporation (FPC), and built Taiwan's first polyvinyl chloride (PVC) plant with a daily production capacity of 4 tons, laying the foundation for Taiwan's plastic industry. In 1958, Nan Ya Plastics Corporation (Nan Ya) was founded to engage in secondary processing of PVC film. It now has developed into a vertically-integrated petrochemical business. FPG's growth mirrors the history of Taiwan's economic development. It created an unparalleled three-stage plastic processing system that served as the bedrock for FPG's sustainable operation, contributing significantly to Taiwan's economic take-off.



Abiding by the urban development policy of Kaohsiung City, operations ceased in April 2014. Then, in March 2018, 13 buildings were registered as memorial and historical buildings after passing the city's cultural heritage review, preserving the original office of the founders, the employee dormitory area, and the adjacent old trees. All these bear witness to the evolution of Taiwan's petrochemical industry over the past 60 years, providing an urban space for tourism and historical and cultural education. The Park aims to stimulate the economic and cultural development of Kaohsiung City.



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7 Employee Cafeteria

Once the staff dormitories, the building was built in 1960. At the beginning of its construction in 1956, the plant already housed a barber shop and a grocery store. These amenities were soon expanded with a watch repair shop, a laundromat, a bazaar, a snack shop, and a beverage shop in 1965. Living conditions further improved with the addition of a billiard room, table-tennis room, library, and so forth.



Founder Yung-Tsai Wang specifically hired a barber from Yanchengpu, Kaohsiung to operate a business that provided 50% discount on haircuts for staff. The remaining cost was subsidized by the company. This shows how highly FPC has valued its employees' welfare from the start. It now has been revived to serve as a barber shop and breakfast canteen.



9 Former Residence of the Wang Founders

Completed in 1959, this was Mr. Yung-Tsai Wang's residence in the Kaohsiung Plant from 1959 to 1968. This period of nearly a decade was a defining stage in FPC's history, showing the founders' commitment—for them, the plant was not only a workplace, but home.

1 2 3 4 Family Dormitory

Built in 1956 to improve the old brick structures, the compound is comprised of 6 buildings housing 32 units. These may be categorized into 4 types of layouts depending on floor area. Two units are preserved to showcase the interiors and furniture of the time, while the rest have been renovated to serve as a variety of shops.

5 Oxcart Plaza

At first, the Kaohsiung Plant only had a daily production capacity of 4 tons of PVC resin. It would gradually increase over time. Due to logistical inconveniences, produced materials were transported via oxcarts to the Port of Kaohsiung every day for export. This vividly depicts FPC's spirit of hard work and steadfastness.

6 Grandma Wang's Diner

FPC's first self-operated F&B scheme, here you can find Wang family banquet dishes, authentic FPC beef steak, and healthy meals that convey the warmth of Mrs. Wang Jhan-yang, mother of the founders, in caring for staff. Treat your taste buds to 6 decades of outstanding history!



8 Water Fetching Children Plaza

In 1958, there was no tap water within the Kaohsiung Plant and tsu-hiap-á (hand pumps) were used to extract water from underground. Thus, there were many tsu-hiap-á around the dorms. When the weather was hot, children would play around these facilities, making them a cherished memory shared by many Taiwanese.
